FURNITURE SEARCH

The Atlanta Historical Society's search for information about NINE-TEENTH CENTURY GEORGIA-MADE FURNITURE has drawn responses from more than 37 Georgia counties as well as other states and countries. The Society's curators are encouraged by the response, but are still eager to receive information before the deadline date of May 1, 1981.

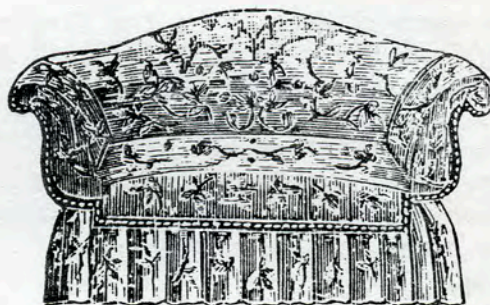
More than 600 pieces of furniture, many of them crafted by known Georgia cabinet-makers, are now represented in the growing research file this survey has produced. Some of the pieces bear the signature of the maker; many have a well-known history of ownership and use in Georgia. Beds, tables, chests, chairs, huntboards, cradles, trunks, and the tools of furniture makers are all of interest to the survey.

The Atlanta Historical Society's furniture survey was conceived as part of preliminary planning for a major loan exhibition on Georgia-made furniture scheduled to open in the Society's Cox Gallery in the fall of 1983. Of particular interest to the Society's curators are pieces with some documentation of the maker or original owner. "Documentation" can take several forms: written records of some sort, the maker's or owner's signature on the piece itself, or a strong family tradition of origin and ownership.

Final selection of approximately 100 pieces for the exhibition will be made during the summer from the information contained in the survey file. It is important that the inventory be as complete as possible by May 1st so that the final selec-

tion will be broadly representative of furniture-making activity in 19th century Georgia.

Furniture owners are encouraged to participate in the inventory project whether or not they will ultimately be willing to lend to the exhibit. The completed inventory will provide an invaluable resource for future research on furniture making in Georgia.



Please look again at the furniture you and your relatives have around you. Encourage your neighbors and friends to participate in this research project. Simple, unadorned pieces of furniture may seem unimportant and yet be of great interest to the Atlanta Historical Society's researchers. The Farmers Market is used as a main resource, which means a larger selection of fresh produce, fish, dairy products, etc., at lower prices.

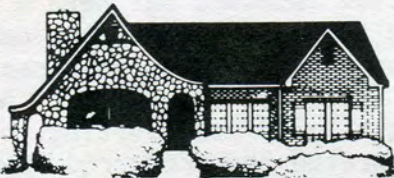

SPOTLIGHT: JOHN HOWELL

John Howell is not a native Atlantan, but after 11 years, "I feel like this is home," he says.

And of that 11 years, John has spent 10 years right in Virginia-Highland. "For a couple of years there I was not sure whether or not we would have a freeway right down the street."

From selling soft drinks at the neighborhood picnic to delivering newsletters, from taking charge of newsletter circulation to working with the Tour or Homes and co-chairing the In-Town Celebration, he has now taken on the responsibility of chairing the Virginia-Highland Steering Committee. His greatest qualification is without a doubt his love for the area.

"I am proud of this neighborhood. I shop here. Everything I need is right here. It is like living in a small town next to the city."

"I like the sidewalks. I like to watch old people taking an unhurried walk and young couples pushing baby carriages. And I have a great view of the city. I can feel the city pulsating."

Our new chairman foresees two major goals in the next year for the Civic Association: broadening of participation and further beautification.

I would like to see more people become active in the Association," he said. "Everyone in the neighborhood is automatically a member, but I would like to see more people taking part."



"You know we have so many talented people right here. It would be great to see some of these people come forward and help with a beautification project. I think a good project would be landscaping along Virginia Avenue."

Originally from Mississippi, John has always been involved in social work. "My father wanted me to become a dentist, but when I was a child I read something about a priest involved in social work and since then I have always wanted to do social work."

"When I came to Georgia I worked with the State Government, but now I work in administration with the U.S. Children's Bureau in the Health and Human Services Department of the Federal Government."

John is instrumental in allocating funds to children's programs in an eight-state southeastern region. These funds are used in programs to alleviate child abuse and neglect, to administer care to foster children and this past year in particular to aid refugee children.

Q. Now that my table has a new finish, how do I keep it looking new?

A. Polish your furniture with an oil polish, such as Old English Red, as often as you "dust." Treat the undersides, insides of drawers and glue joints with lemon oil about 3 times a year.

Q. Should I wax my new furniture?

A. No, the finishes used today do not require waxing.

ATKINS PARK ON HISTORIC ZONING

The Atkins Park Home Owners Association has been exploring the benefits of historic zoning for our neighborhood. Historic zoning would assure that alterations, new developments, and demolitions in Atkins Park would progress in a coherent manner and preserve the historic and cultural significance of the area. In exchange for these safeguards, homeowners are required to obtain a certificate of appropriateness from the Urban Design Commission before making changes to the exterior appearance of property which is visible from public ways.

The new zoning ordinance allows for the creation of Historic and

Cultural Conservation Districts (HC). The designation of HC Districts is intended to foster civic beauty; insure harmonious and orderly growth and development; raise community expectations and awareness of the city's cultural heritage; and preserve sites and structures which are unique and irreplaceable assets to the city.

All HC Districts must require a certificate of appropriateness for changes to exterior appearance, erection of new structures and additions to existing structures, demolition or moving of structures, and/or off-street parking for three or more vehicles visible from public ways. The ordinance allows an HC District to determine additional regulations. Such things as trees, landscaping, set backs, heights, density, and signs, just to mention a few, can be added to the zoning ordinance. The HC zoning regulations will be the only zoning regulations applicable to Atkins Park.

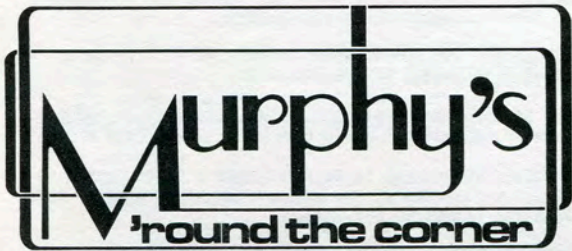
