

# 911...Operator This Is An Emergency

To expedite your prepared to do the follow

- I) Give the reason for break-in, burglary, peeping Tom, etc.)
- Be prepared to answer the 911 operator's questions quickly and concisely.

Be clear and vivid in your descriptions, with as much detail as possible. For example, it is not necessary to say that you normally go to sleep at 11 but tonight you went to sleep at 10 because your husband Tom went out-of-town to visit his sick aunt. Just tell the operator that you saw someone peeping in your window and that you're frightened and alone. Give the best description you can.

#### (A) Why All the Silly Questions?

Let's say you're driving down the street and you see an accident. You whip out your trusty mobile phone and quickest manner possible. Yes, sometimes the 911 operator is so accustomed to asking certain questions that it might seem absurd in your particular situation. No one ever said the system was perfect. Try to understand what the 911 operator hears all day long, and have a little patience.

#### (B) Descriptions Are Very Important

It's not good enough to give the gender and race of a suspect. Was he or she wearing a hat? Did he or she limp? What about facial hair, glasses, items he/she is carrying? Which way did he/she head? Did he resemble the hunchback of Notre Dame?

Note: It is extremely important to give your own description if you have a weapon. Let's say you hear a noise in

The United States has a snobbish attitude (not shared by most other countries) in making a distinction between the various artistic endeavors and rating them in stature. This constantly pits the so-called fine artist against the crafts person.

My own feeling is that everyone who makes ART is an artist and should only be judged by the quality and/or desirability of the items produced. Originality is always a key factor, but I had an art teacher who said, "If you think you're original, you're just a lousy researcher."

So if you find something you like that's one-of-a-kind and made by a person, it probably is ART—so enjoy it! A lot of these somethings can be found in our neighborhood. The following are a few suggested places to look:

**Karibou Boutique** 

780 N. Highland (in the Alley) 875-7502

Nadia Giordani is the owner of this shop specializing in leather and clay masks from Haiti. She also carries other Haitian art and African clothing, paintings and wood sculpture. All are exotic and nicely done.

Chassie Post

804 N. Highland Avenue 892 -1072

An official-looking gallery space dealing in young, up-and-coming artists from Eastern Europe, Latin America and Africa, who are frequently based in New York. Openings attract a diverse group, eating and drinking. The shows change often and vary greatly in style and quality. Owner Chassie Post and director Mark

Cline do a lot of traveling to far-off places to find art work. Some of it is excellent.

#### Mike's Rules on Buying a Bicycle

Yea! It's finally Spring! The ideal time for bicycling...unless you don't have a bicycle, that is. But if you want to buy one, here is some information to help you shop.

Today, there are basically two kinds of stores from which to buy bicycles—department stores and bike shops. There are three types of bikes from which to choose: road bikes, mountain bikes and hybrids. (I'll discuss children's bikes in another article.)

These two kinds of stores carry very different products. Department stores typically carry an array of inexpensive bicycles ranging from \$119 to \$189. They are usually made in one size and assembled very quickly. American-made bicycles in this price range are usually higher quality products than the imported ones.

However, either one will require considerably more maintenance than better bikes. They will need adjustments to the bearings and cables within one to three hours of initial riding and then two or three times a year thereafter. If you're not sure if you want to take up cycling and want to try it first, or if you'll only ride a few times a year, this type of bike may be for you.


If you do buy an inexpensive bike, have a bike shop put it together (or reassemble it) for you. You'll pay more for the assembly but the bike will be thoroughly checked out, debugged and checked over again after you ride it for a while. It will work better and last longer if professionally assembled.

Bike shops, on the other hand, sell high quality bicycles. They come in several sizes in order to fit different sized people. They are, therefore, more comfortable and easier to ride. These bikes work better, last longer, ride smoother and require less maintenance than inexpensive ones. In addition, they're assembled at no extra charge and come with a free check-over.

You'll also find knowledgeable sales people at a bike store to fit you, instruct you and let you test ride the bike before you buy it. Of course, quality bicycles cost more, but you get a lot for your money. They range from the mid-\$200's and up.

In bike shops, you'll find three types of bicycles from which to choose: road bikes (as opposed to off-road

#### A Yellow Raft In Blue Water

by Michael Dorris

Three generations of Indian women from a Montana reservation will capture your soul. Ida, the matriarch, has kept a family secret that has burdened her to the point of fierceness. Her connection to her daughter Christine doesn't resemble love but seems more like an unraveling rope which never breaks.

Christine has spent years trying to escape her mother's hold and the effect her brother's life and death has had on all her relationships. She is both dependent on and indifferent to her own daughter, Rayona, a teenager of Indian and Black heritage who is angry and tough and filled with a tenuous wisdom that will break your heart. As the three of them careen toward the revelation of the secret, you'll marvel at their strong hold on life.

#### The Crown of Columbus

by Michael Dorris and his wife, Louise Erdrich

These reviews are incelebration of Michael Dorris' contributions to some of the best reading around. Dorris is of American Indian heritage and the main character in this book is an American Indian woman (he writes from a female viewpoint better than most male authors).

Vivian Twostar, who vividly lives up to her name, is an anthropology professor at Dartmouth. She lives with her grandmother, who must constantly be shoved into civility, and a teenage son, Nash, determined to undermine any pleasure in the household.

When Vivian stumbles into love with fellow professor Roger Williams (named for white bread) and mothers his child, she doesn't enhance her family relations. She uncovers some information in the college archives related

#### Fleeman's Drugstore

Surely, the corner drugstore wasn't always on the corner in my youth but we always called it that. And in its local reincarnation, it really is—on the corner. Fleeman's has been in operation since 1914. Its fountain has been closed for the last few years but now is serving again.

Egg salad, chicken salad, tuna salad, BLT on unfancy bread with chips and pickles—just like always and it tastes good and fresh like your mama made. Myra Jackson says it's like her mama made too, and she and her husband Robert have brought back a neighborhood tradition with homey touches. She makes soup or chili everyday and brings it in a big electric pot since cooking is not done on the premises. The chili is mild and tasty and can have a dash of hot sauce added for tongues that require it.

There are tables and chairs plus counter seating and papers and magazines to read while you eat. A lot of Coke memorabilia decorates the place. Even the outside wall has a giant Coke ad painted on it. It goes back a lot of years and has a special history—there's only one other like it or something like that. It looks like it stepped out of the Coke museum.

This is a great neighborhood meetingplace. The local merchants have already become regulars. When I go in, someone calls out "Chocolate phosphate coming up." I like that and I've always loved phosphates. The combination of sweet and bitter is addictive. They are hard to find and as long as Fleeman's serves them, I'm drinking there. The food is good and reasonably priced with a touch of nostalgia thrown in. I'm a regular.





your house, and you grab your gun and call 911. Describe what you look like and what weapon you are brandishing. Put that weapon down when the police arrive on the scene to show you are the good guy. If you fail to do this, do not expect them to recognize you as the victim instead of the perpetrator. Criminals come in all sizes, shapes and colors. Furthermore, if you should decide to defend yourself with a firearm, be sure you know how to use it as well as your legal rights to use it.

#### (C) Just Who Needs an Attitude Adjustment?

When you are in need of the police, most likely you have experienced or are experiencing something quite emotional. We would all like to think that whomever shows up at your time of need will be sympathetic to your situation. If you want "warm fuzzies," call a shrink. Do not expect that from the 911 operator or the police officer.

What may appear on the surface to be a quick, cold attitude with no expression of compassion could simply be a conscientious officer trying to get back on your streets or on to another emergency call. Or it could be someone having a bad day, just like you do sometimes. So don't get bent out of shape if his or her attitude does not meet your expectations.

#### (D) To Come to Your Home or Not...That is the Question.

Specifically tell the operator whether you want the responding officer to come to your house or not. This applies mainly to calls where no crime has actually been committed at your home. For instance, you spy a suspicious individual walking down the street looking in car windows. Most of us would prefer that the officer not appear at our doorstep with said suspicious individual for identification purposes.

#### (E) Won't They Ever Get Here?

You have called 911 and it seems like hours before someone arrives. Officers are dispatched according to priority. Suppose you arrive home at night and find that your home was burglarized prior to your arrival. This is not a priority call. However, it IS a priority call if you arrive home and the burglar is still present. Your perception of time as you wait for the police to come will most likely be incorrect. Emotions play games with time perception. One minute seems like ten, ten minutes seems like thirty, etc.

#### (F) "Suspicious Persons"

Yes, I know you don't like

unknown individuals walking down your street for no reason, but that is not a crime. To involve the police, a suspicious person has to be guilty of more than just walking down the street. Is he or she looking in car windows? Peering into houses? Carrying your neighbor's brand new stereo equipment? Now we're talking suspicious!

#### (G) Let Me Speak to **Your Supervisor**

If you find that you are truly dissatisfied with your 911 operator, insist on speaking to a supervisor.

#### (H) Stand Up and Be Counted

No matter how small the crime, report it. Whether you think anything can be done about it or not, report it. If your car is broken into, report it. (Car breakins can be taken over the phone.) All crimes must be reported to be counted. For example, six residents of a townhouse complex had their cars broken into one night but only one of them reported the incident. The precinct had no idea that the street had had a major problem that night.

Remember: reporting is important because the squeaky wheel gets the oil!





visible. They include the historical significance of ordination of women deacons (six of the eight currently are women) and withdrawal of the church from the fundamentalist-dominated Southern Baptist Convention in 1992, with the resulting new name.

"These changes stress the congregation's desire to welcome everyone to the life and ministry of the church and to be open to freedom of inquiry in a theological setting," Tim comments. All this from a church established in 1923 which, until recently, embraced more conservative views. Under Tim's leadership, the congregation decided to make changes for the times and the kinds of people who populate the Virginia-Highland area.

There is a daycare center operating in the building run by an independent group that leases space. The church has given office space to the John Howell Park Project and has offered

meeting space to other neighborhood groups. The church provides a storage room for the Inman School Festival and has opened its facilities to a dance group for recitals.

Last year during Summerfest, the ladies of the church had a big-draw bake sale with delicious goodies favored by all sweet tooths. They plan to participate again this year. Their attitude about any inconvenience caused by blocked streets and restricted access to parking for Sunday morning church services has been to join in the celebration and use it to their advantage—an attitude that certainly endears them to Summerfest planners.


When the church broke away from the Southern Baptists, it remained part of the Alliance of Baptist, a national organization which tackles important issues of concern to its congregations across the country and maintains a continued insistence on separation of church and state. The church is still affiliated with the Cooperative Baptist

Fellowship, an Atlanta-based national group with moderate views. The church also supports the Druid Hills Churches Association community center which provides food, clothing, referrals to shelters, phones and restrooms to the many homeless in our area.

I think this progressive attitude can be attributed to Tim. His own personal commitment to neighborhood involvement means he's become a familiar figure at meetings and forums. We've grown accustomed to his willingness to help with problems and find solutions.

He's very serious about his role in offering a challenge to people concerning their religion. He always gives their questions respect, and is the first one to admit that even he doesn't have all the answers and is searching himself



bikes), mountain bikes and hybrids. A road bike has thin tires and down-turned handlebars. Until the last few years, this racing style bike was the most prevalent kind. They are best used for long distance riding and competition, although they also make fine city bikes. Road bikes are

fast, efficient and responsive, but can only be ridden on pavement.

Mountain bikes are the most popular style bicycle today. They evolved for off-road riding and that is where they excel. They have fat tires and up-right handlebars. Large tires give the bike a very stable and smooth ride, but they are slow in the street. However,

a wide selection of tires are available for mountain bikes to adapt them for on or off-road use. These are versatile bicycles.

Recently hybrids have been introduced. These bikes are a cross between road and mountain bikes. They have up-right handlebars and a medium-sized tire that make them ideal city bikes.

They retain some of the lightness and responsiveness of a road bike yet are rugged enough to handle city streets. They can also be ridden off-street on smooth, hard packed surfaces like dirt roads or camp grounds.

As you can see, bicycles are now more specifically designed for their intended use. But determining what type

of bicycle you need and where to shop for it is only the first step in buying one. There are other details to consider such as size, brand, model and price differences, operation and maintenance. These questions can be discussed in detail when you shop for your bike.


But regardless of what type bike you buy or where you buy it, I encourage you
