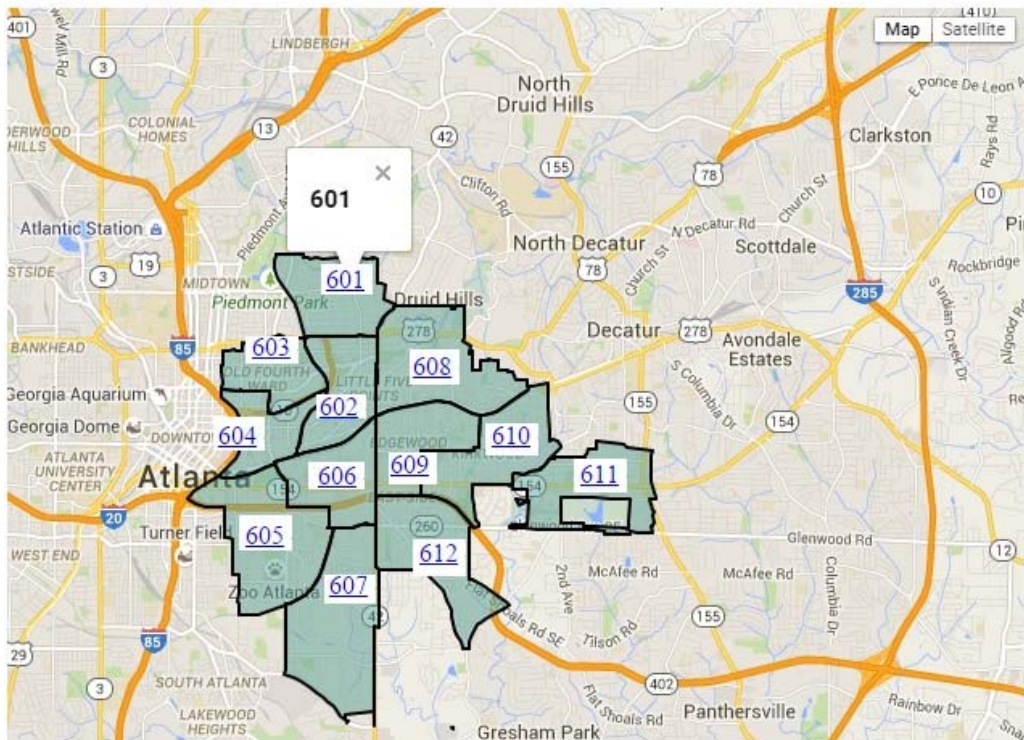


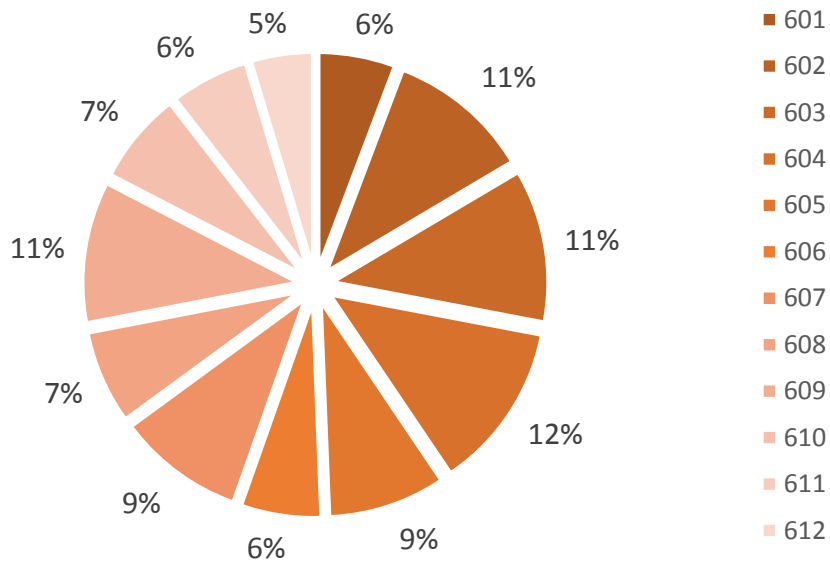
City of Atlanta Zone 6 Beat Map

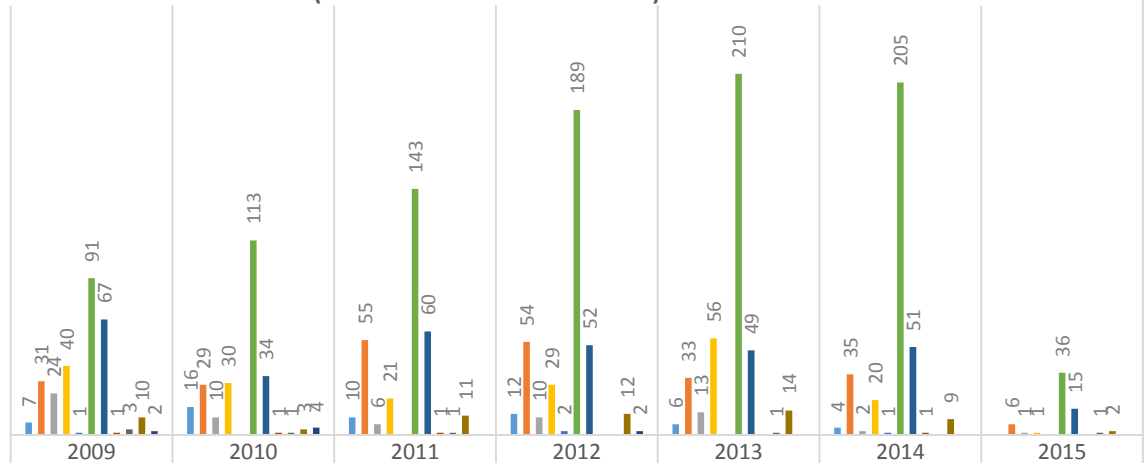


City of Atlanta - Zone 6

Burglary v. Robbery v. Larceny

Robbery and burglary are both crimes that involve theft; the surrounding circumstances differentiate them. In addition to burglary and robbery, the legal definition of theft encompasses additional categories such as larceny, theft, and extortion.

Robbery

Robbery is defined as **taking (or trying to take) something from someone that has value by utilizing intimidation, force, or threat**. In order for robbery to take place, a **victim** (or multiple victims) **must be present** at the scene.

Burglary

Burglary is defined as an **unlawful entry to a structure to commit theft or a felony**. A **victim** does not have to be present, but a structure – which includes business offices, personal homes, and even external sheds – must be involved. (Note: Burglary is **not** the term used for crimes committed on cars.)

Larceny

Larceny is similar to burglary, but without the element of a structure. The exception to this rule is the **burglary of a motor vehicle, which is referred to as larceny**. Under all conditions - whether a vehicle is left with the doors locked or unlocked, the windows are open or not, or the security system is or is not engaged - vehicle “burglary” crimes are referred to as larceny.
