Build a Playground at John Howell Park

The Virginia-Highland Civic Association and the City of Atlanta Parks Department invite you to join them on Saturday, November 15 at John Howell Park for "Build the Playground Day". The building of the Cunard Memorial Playground will begin at 7am and end at dark. Rain date is November 22. Because of safety concerns, the committee asks that you leave children at home until the playscape is completed.

This playground is being developed as a memorial to Lisa Cunard and her sons Max, three, and Owen, five months, who were killed when a tree fell on their car during a storm this summer. The Cunards, along with father Brad Cunard, were members of the Virginia-Highland community.

If you are interested in helping, come prepared for some hard work and contact the planners at cunardplayground@yahoo.com or 404-222-8244. According to playground committee chairperson Cynthia Gentry, a neighbor of the Cunard family, help is needed in putting together playground equipment, planting bulbs and raking. Breakfast, lunch and dinner will be served

The committee is also accepting contributions to offset the cost of the playground, which is \$135,000. To date, the committee has raised \$50,000. Contributions of \$1,000 or more will be recognized on a donor plaque at the playground. Contributions are tax deductible as allowed by law.

Dramatic Transformation of Piedmont Park Continues With the Help of VHCA Challenge Grant

Visitors to Piedmont Park are sure to notice some of the many improvements that have taken place over the last few months. Among the improvements are: the opening of the restored Tenth St. Meadow with its 15 acres of beautiful new lawn; new double-sided swings around Lake Clara Meer; the addition of nearly two dozen permanent grills and the restoration of the stone grills near the picnic pavilion area; new landscaping on the Front Lawn near the Noguchi playground, including trees, perennials, ground covers; and sod and new directional signage obelisks at entrances to the park.

Upcoming improvements will include: a new volleyball area at the south end of the ball fields area; renovation and redesign of the picnic pavilion and bandstand, including new seating, lighting, landscaping and a new lawn; improvements to the Piedmont Avenue edge of the park including widening of sidewalks; a drop-off lane between Twelfth and Fourteenth Streets; a new ornamental fence and hedge and more trees; improvements to the Front Lawn, including new lighting, benches, drinking fountains

Public Menorah Lighting

The intersection of Virginia and North Highland will host Virginia-Highland's first public menorah lighting on Sunday, December 21 at 6:00 p.m. The event is free and open to everyone.

Approximately 2,200 years ago, the Syrian/Greek armies conquered the land of Israel, forbade the observance of Jewish tradition, and desecrated the Temple in Jerusalem. Under the leadership of the Maccabees, the Jewish people successfully defeated the larger and better equipped enemy armies in a series of miraculous battles. Immediately following the victory the Jewish people were ready to re-dedicate their holy Temple by re-lighting the sacred candelabra called a "menorah." Miraculously, just one day's worth of oil burned for eight days and nights. exactly enough time for the new supply of oil to arrive. For the past 2,200 years since, Jews have observed Chanukah in honor of this historic victory and the miracle of the oil. A cornerstone of the holiday's observance is the lighting of an eight-branched menorah to "publicize" the miracle of the oil lasting for eight days.

The Menorah is a symbol of religious freedom. Chabad Intown of Virginia-Highland is pleased to introduce this notable tradition to Atlanta. The symbolic lighting of the Virginia-Highland menorah will be done by high ranking public officials after a few brief remarks by the rabbi. Latkes and jelly doughnuts, traditional Chanukah foods, will be distributed to those gathered. Other small activities are planned for the children.

I am pleased to announce that we have established several new records in 2003! First, we raised \$76,000 at Summerfest. Thanks to the Summerfest committee: Pierce Pape (5K Race Director), Cynthia Gentry (Artist Chair), and Jean Jordan and Jill Gossett (Volunteer Coordinators). Thanks also to Wiley Sommerville, Kris Reinhard and Steve Kushner for all their hard work on the Oversight Committee. If His Excellency, Juan Antonio Samaranch former head of the Olympics, were to have attended the 2003 Summerfest, I know he would say it was "The Best Ever."

Summerfest, however, is not about making a profit. We see it as a means to enable us to give back to the neighborhood. Money from the Summerfest has allowed us to contribute a total of \$46,000 to our neighborhood this year. A special thank you and recognition were given to Jenn Ballentine and Krista Miller for their help in publishing the *Virginia-Highland Voice* for the past two years.



Gardening in Virginia-Highland Has Come a Long Way Since the '70's

Thanks to a Hands on Atlanta volunteer day project, I learned of a neighborhood area I had never seen before. I was part of an enthusiastic group that cleaned up the end of Cresthill Avenue as it dead ends at the Beltline railroad tracks at Piedmont Park. Special recognition needs to go to the employee volunteers from Ed Castro Landscape Company who brought along cleanup equipment and a truck and dumpster to haul away the debris. It is nice to see suburban-based companies take an interest in the city and its problems.

After enjoying the humorous lecture at The Botanical Garden by Felding Rusher, I bought two of his books that I had long wanted - *Passalong Plants* and *Tough Plants For Southern Gardens*. They are both well-written, easy-to-read reference books that I heartily recommend. They are in stock at The Botanical Garden gift shop. Rushing's newest book is about scarecrows, which tied in nicely with the current exhibit of scarecrows in the Garden. A great pumpkin-butted scarecrow is in the neighborhood at Barnett and Drewry Streets.

Special thanks to the Atkins Park gardeners who keep their gateway entrances creatively planted and maintained as well as planting and tending the curbside along North Highland Avenue in their district. Some good garden and landscape idea spots I have seen lately aregreat handling of having a driveway serve as a front entrance walkway from the street at 797 Ponce de Leon Terrace. The biggest potted coleus in the neighborhood have to be on the front porch at 853 Ponce de Leon Place. They are well mixed with ornamental grasses in the containers. The iron-fenced-in garden at 919 North Highland Avenue at Rosedale Road is maturing nicely and will be a neighborhood standout. There is a great example of streetside plantscaping at 765 Ponce de Leon Terrace with a creative mixture of plants with contrasting foliage color and texture.

The interest in gardening in this neighborhood has come a long way from when I first moved here in the 1970's. With few exceptions, the landscaping then consisted mainly of ill-tended azaleas, hydrangeas, privets and some marigolds and petunias. We're really becoming a real garden spot now as more and more residents are showing concern as to the appearance of their lawn and garden areas. And I know there certainly were no professionally created and tended gardens here in the 1970's either.
