Project Set to Start After Summerfest



Phase II of the project to improve the streetscape at the intersection of Virginia Ave. and N. Highland Ave. will begin just after Summerfest (early June). The goal is to complete most work – short of "finishing touches" - before Thanksgiving, so retailers are not adversely impacted during the holiday shopping period. Total cost for both Phase I and II \$550,000, with \$450,000 from federal funds and the remainder coming from local Quality of Life funds.

Phase I, completed last year, involved installation of approximately 400 feet of new sidewalk on both sides of N. Highland (from Virginia Ave. to Todd Rd.) and approximately 330 feet of new sidewalk on the north side of Virginia Ave. The sidewalk was widened to 8 or 12ft., using attractive hexagonal concrete pavers and granite curbs. Historically appropriate pedestrian lighting was added, along with new garbage receptacles, signage, benches, bike racks, curb cuts and turn lane improvements. The Bradford pear trees that previously existed were replaced with Chinese Elms.

Phase II will provide similar improvements to the south side of Virginia Ave. and on both sides of N. Highland Ave. south from Virginia to approximately the Aurora Coffee Shop. Phase II features an expanded and improved "island" in front of Taco Mac/Murphy's, and also includes:

- 7 foot wide sidewalks and 5 foot amenity zone for trees and furniture, for a total of 12 feet. In some areas, this is narrowed to fit existing conditions;
- Landscaped area in island will be increased by over 1,000 square feet;
- The dedicated right (southbound) turn lane off eastbound Virginia Avenue will become a one-way drive only from Virginia toward N. Highland Ave. A sharp right (w/ curb cut) will require drivers to slow considerably when turning from Virginia Ave. into the parking area. Existing parking in front of Murphy's, Taco Mac, Dr. Kaplan, Urban Cottage, and Aurora Coffee Shop will be preserved. Exiting onto N. Highland Ave. from this lane will be a right turn only.

- The expanded island adjacent to the dedicated right turn lane will include better defined curb lines, pedestrian scale lighting, street trees and added landscape space.
- If impacted commercial property owners agree to angled parking, the City will repave that area, with owner permission. Property owners (Murphy's/Taco Mac) will lose one parking space if parking is angled.
- Eastbound Virginia Ave. will remain two lanes, and the right turn onto N. Highland Ave. at the traffic light will accommodate bus turning with a 50 foot curb radius.
- While some utility poles will be relocated or removed, utilities will generally remain in place and not be placed underground due to high cost.
- Trees Atlanta will be charged with planting trees in the landscaped area, and will be funded with part of the project budget to do so. The VHCA Parks Committee will work closely with Trees Atlanta to finalize landscaping design for the new island. The proposed tree palette for Phase II includes Allee Elms, First Lady Cherry (flowering tree) and Overcup Oak.

In the past few months, two meetings were held to gather resident input to proposed plans. The final plan reflects modifications to

the original draft, in response to residents' input. Plans and project timelines will be displayed at the island prior to demolition. A copy of the plan can be seen above and is also viewable in PDF format at *vahi.org*.

We are very excited about this project. This facelift will not only be aesthetically pleasing, it will make our neighborhood safer, incent more pedestrian traffic, and improve our commercial and residential property values.

The 2007 Virginia-Highland Tour of Homes was held December 8th and 9th. Thanks to increased publicity, citywide exposure, and newly designed light post banners, gross ticket sales surged to over \$28,000, after not exceeding \$19,000 in any year since the event was resumed in 2004. Final net income figures will be available after trailing expenses and sponsorships are accounted for. Overall, in four years the tour has raised over \$80,000 to fund park improvements, donations to neighborhood schools, zoning projects and the neighborhood sidewalk initiative.

Zipcar Comes to Va-Hi

Tired of the significant expense that comes with car ownership? Feel like you could take at least one car off the road in these 'green' times if only you had access to a vehicle once in a while? Car sharing might be the ticket for you.

Flexcar – now Zipcar after a merger of the two companies late last year – opened a location in Virginia-Highland recently. The combined company is the world's largest provider of car-sharing services, offering self-service, on-demand cars by the hour or day.

With Zipcar's technology, reserving, accessing and using a Zipcar is as easy as getting cash from an ATM. In just minutes and up to a year in advance, members can reserve zip cars on-line or by phone, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Zipcar members have automated access to Zipcars using a 'Zipcard' to simply unlock the door and drive away. Rates are as low as \$7.50 per hour or \$56 per day with gas, parking, insurance and maintenance included.

In Va-Hi, Zipcars can be found at the Lot 21 parking lot at the corner of N. Highland Ave. and Briarcliff Place, across from American Roadhouse. The two cars assigned to our neighborhood are a 2007 White Toyota Prius and a 2007 white Mini Cooper (for what it's worth, Zipcar says the Prius has been more popular than the Mini Cooper). The company says more cars will be added as area demand increases.



Va-Hi Safety Team Report

Having reached the one-year milestone of our public safety initiative, I want to thank all those involved in keeping our neighborhood alert, aware, and, consequently, safer. But for every resident now receiving my electronic reports, I'm sure there are many more who are not receiving them who would like to. With a goal of increasing participation – which benefits us all – let me explain how the safety team functions.

My basic theory of crime prevention is that people who know each other tend to look out for each other. As street captains step forward to organize their street, block, apartment/condo building or work place, they first reach out to their neighbors and co-workers to gather a list of names and e-mail addresses. This helps increase the distribution list for the electronic reports, raising more awareness.

A great next step is to have an informal social gathering so neighbors can meet and become familiar with one another. Many streets captains have gone even further by setting up meetings with our APD Zone 6 Crime Prevention Officer, Inspector Ruby Naylor, at which additional ways to keep safe are discussed. Resident directories have been compiled for some streets, so neighbors can quickly get in touch with each other when leaving town, having work done on their house, etc.

Realizing that every street is composed of unique individuals, what works in one place, may not work in another. But the underlying concept and end result is much the same: awareness of what is happening in our area is increased. So, if you live in a part of Va-Hi that doesn't receive the Safety Team Reports, please e-mail me at safety@vahi.org, and I'll be glad to work with you to organize your own little part of our world.

Even with these efforts we can't expect crime to completely disappear from Va-Hi. We have to realize we live in the middle of a large city – but we can learn to plan our everyday activities to avoid situations where we may encounter danger. I worry sometimes that the electronic reports may unnerve or scare some folks, but please don't take them this way. Look at the reports as a way to keep yourself aware and alert. Things – sometimes bad things – are going to happen around us, so it's far better to be aware and knowledgeable, than to live with your head buried in the sand.

Another benefit of the Safety Team initiative is making more eyes and ears available to Zone 6 to let them know – via your 911 calls – of situations where "something is just not right". Follow your instincts when you see or hear something that you think the police should know about. It's far better to call about something unnecessarily than to not call and hear later you could have prevented something bad from happening. We are getting much better at using 911 and, since we all know there are not enough police on our streets, we all have an obligation to ourselves and our fellow citizens to help APD do their jobs.

We're all in this together – our unity and awareness can make the difference between whether we collectively sink or swim.

Colonel Mustard in the Kitchen With a Knife

Colonel Mustard – referring to the character from the board game Clue – is a pseudonym for a Virginia-Highland resident who enjoys dining at the many wonderful restaurants in our neighborhood and sharing thoughts on the dining experience with others. In this issue the Colonel takes a look at a mainstay of the neighborhood: La Tavola Trattoria.

Saturday night is busy, busy at La Tavola. Fortunately, our group of four ready-to-be-fed Italian food lovers had made a reservation. It's fair to say the place is more popular than it really has room for. Customers and servers jockey for position around the tables. The servers are adroit at weaving through with trays and going to the restroom is a 'getting-to-know-your-neighbor' experience as you wind and bump your way to the back of the restaurant. Nobody minds and everyone smiles. These are robust and discerning customers and workers.

On this night we had out-of-town visitors with us who have dined all over the country as well as internationally, including in Italy. The first thing they ordered was a negroni cocktail. Their faces couldn't hide their amazement – first, that the waitress knew what they were ordering and second, that the cocktail was very well made with gin, Campari and sweet vermouth. I let out a sigh of relief since our friends are considered gourmets. The relief, though, would be short-lived.

First, we shared the seared sea scallops appetizer with polenta, spinach and tomatoes. The dish comes with three scallops and the waitress added a fourth so we could easily share. This was an outstanding dish that I will have all to myself next time. As an entrée, I had spaghettini with tomatoes, basil and veal meatballs - I love meatballs and these were very good. My husband ordered the grilled sword fish with capers. He thought the portion was a little small but was able to fill up on the sides of roasted sweet potatoes and spinach, all good. One of our guests had baked manicotti made with beef, veal, pancetta, spinach and mozzarella. She said this dish is always a good test for an Italian restaurant. There was a little hesitation but she ended up enjoying it.

But here was the kicker: our other gourmet ordered the veal scallopine. It arrived quite dry from over cooking. Our friend the raconteur - a famously charming man with a Puerto Rican accent - had already entertained our server with his expertise and he took this opportunity to inform her exactly how scallopine should be prepared. She took the dish off and the manager returned with a new plate and stayed to see how it was received. Ah - good at last! The waitress and manager couldn't have been more gracious and the relief again was sweet. Bottom line, the evening was a success!

In-town Cycling: Family Style by: Cycle N

For the Macketts, bicycling means seeing more of the world around them. Father Brad says: "Cycling allows us to venture out to places and events around the city that we probably wouldn't go to if we had to drive or walk".

Today I'm joining in on one of their family cycling outings that includes stops at Grant Park and Oakland Cemetery. Neighborhood festivals are also favorite stops for the Macketts. Mother Eileen says cycling works better for visiting festivals, "because we can actually get there quicker and don't have to hassle with parking the car."

There's no festival today, but we'll hit some of the many parks and other destinations within cycling distance of Virginia-Highland.

Twelve year old Sarah mentions a couple of stops popular with motorists – only she doesn't take up a parking space! Sarah explains: "You'll find that bike riding gives you a good chance to really look at houses you like or stores you adore." It's a positive sign of our times that a 12-year-old already understands the importance of slowing down and enjoying life.

And if the mood strikes you, it's easy to hop off your bike to get a smoothie or join a pickup ball game. Ten year old Bradley understands the fun factor of riding bikes. "Always go someplace fun. If you love baseball, go to the baseball field. If soccer's your thing, go someplace and kick a soccer ball."

How do the Macketts cycle Atlanta's streets safely with kids? Eileen says: "I wish there were more bike paths, but we seem to handle the streets and sidewalks just fine."

As a child, the bicycle was Eileen's primary way to visit friends. "I'd love to be able to let my children 'go' like I was able to, but in the city with all the traffic, that's not possible. That means if I have to be a child again and go with them – so be it!"

Group rides on streets alongside traffic are also a treat. Riding in traffic is much less intimidating for new riders when it's done with a group. An experienced group provides ample opportunity to observe and practice the skills required to safely and courteously share the road with motorists.

And then there are the places closed to traffic. There's much debate about "segregating" bikes from motorists, but as Brad puts it: "We all need a place to lose our training wheels!"

Piedmont Park, the PATH trails, and even April's Tour de Georgia Circuit Race provide great opportunities to ride without traffic. Orme Park: Master Plan Takes Shape

The two-year conceptual design process for Orme Park's Master Plan has ended. Both VHCA and NPU-F approved the park's Conceptual Master Plan at their December meetings, and the Orme Park Committee now turns its attention to the more formidable and long-range challenge of raising funds for site-specific drawings and construction.


Major thematic elements of the park will be unchanged. Protecting and enhancing the park's trees and riparian corridor will still be emphasized, along with removal of invasive plants and restoration of native plant species.

The north side of the park will continue to feature playground equipment and open space for small-scale gatherings and informal recreation, but equipment will be relocated and entry points re-evaluated. The Brookridge Drive bridge and existing stairs on both sides of it will be restored in a yet unspecified fashion. The bridge in its original state had a certain grandeur that has disappeared with the decades.

The park's south side will remain sylvan. Boardwalks will be added in some areas, and the trail will be more defined than others, but the area's role as an arboreal retreat will endure. The privet and elaeagnus that dominate the understory and the steep banks under Elmwood Drive will be eradicated and slowly replaced with native plants.

Stream restoration is also a primary goal of the plan, but the process is both expensive and disruptive and will likely await another opportunity such as sewer repair, a tree coming down, or some other similar event.


